Dear Brothers and Sisters of St. Paul's Cathedral,

It is my great pleasure to offer you greetings as we start to bid farewell to 2023. With just about a month until the beginning of Advent, and the parallel bustle of the holiday season, a time of great preparation will soon be upon us all.

Another sort of preparedness is taking place, as your Chapter members and Dean Nicola create the Cathedral's operating budget for 2024, projected as of now to be approximately \$450,000. The Cathedral leadership has been vigilant, especially in the years since 2020, of examining all expenses to ensure that they efficiently contribute to the mission of St. Paul's. The budget includes all of the things that make our place of worship special, from our dedicated clergy and staff, to our liturgical responsibilities, to important community outreach through music and compassionate care, and the needs of a historic church facility.

Those expenses are funded by two primary sources of income – plate and pledge offerings (75%) and distributed income from the endowment (20%). The reality is that for the last two years, pledge income has not kept pace with our expenses, and it has been necessary to draw additional funds from our endowment to cover that gap. We are fortunate to have this resource available, but this is not a viable long-term solution.

We are working hard to build membership and engagement, but to ensure that we continue to operate and grow our presence in the community, being a source of light and joy and respite to all who enter our doors while remaining fiscally stable, we as a cathedral congregation must pull together and provide the funding necessary to balance our budget.

I ask that you prayerfully discern what a healthy and dynamic Cathedral looks like for you and make a pledge for 2024 that helps to achieve that vision.

If you made a pledge in 2023, please consider an increase in your giving, and thank you. If you have given in years past, please renew your relationship with St. Paul's, and thank you. And if you have not yet offered your first pledge to the Cathedral, please make a commitment today at the amount that is right for you, and thank you!

I believe that Advent is a season of excitement, and anticipation, and most of all, of hope. Perhaps now more than ever, the world needs beacons of hope, and love, and peace. The world needs places like St. Paul's, and with your help, we can proudly proclaim God's love, and that all are welcome within our glorious house.

1885 Building Revitalization Project Update

Asbestos removal began on November 27 and will take two or three weeks to complete at a cost of approximately \$30,000.

On October 12, St. Paul's leaders met with Mr. Al Sievers of Environmental Protection Solutions which has been engaged to remove asbestos from the undercroft. Asbestos is found in the floor, wall panels, adhesive, and ceiling tile in some areas of the Undercroft and must be removed before the general contractor can install a new heating and cooling system. The work will conclude with testing of air samples to ensure no airborne asbestos remains.



Please respect all signage and keep out of work areas while abatement work is conducted!







Asbestos abatement work began with work on the smaller rooms first. On the left is the presently sealed-off entrance to a room which had served various functions: an office for the Sexton, a Diocesan Loan Closet, and most recently a store room for Connection Café . Middle, a former storage room. On the right is a detail showing asbestos-containing glue pucks which must all be removed.

Congregational Gift to the Dean

Many thanks to the generosity of the Parish for gifts to the Very Reverend Nicola Dance as the 5th Dean of the Cathedral. One of the gifts was a cassock suitable for a Cathedral Dean, as seen in the accompanying photograph. It was custom made for her by the North East Church Supply Company in England.

The cassock is considered everyday wear for a priest; in the Anglican tradition, the Dean's cassock is piped and trimmed in red. This cassock has 33 buttons in embroidered red. The cassock always includes 33 buttons, signifying the tradition of Christ's age at the time of his crucifixion and resurrection.

You will see Amma wearing it on occasions such as Evensong, and other events that do not include the Eucharist.

The remaining funds from the designated gifts will be used for the Clergy Continuing Education Fund. Again, thank you so much for your generosity.

What is the Advent Tea?



The suite of windows in the High Street Chapel was ordered in 1953 during the rectorship of the Reverend P.M. Casady and installed in late 1954. Designed and fabricated by Connick Associates in Boston. In terms of "pedigree," these windows may be the most significant ones at St. Paul's. Connick Associates, which closed in 1986, traced its origins to stained-glass artist Charles J. Connick (1875-1945). Reacting against the proliferation of opalescent, Tiffany-style glass at the turn of the century, Connick became a leading proponent of the Gothic Revival in the early 20th century. He advocated a return not only to the principles of Gothic art but also to the collaborative working methods of the medieval guilds. Connick and his artists helped spread a new appreciation for the architecture and stained glass of 12th- and 13th-century England and France. The firm supplied windows for an international clientele. Like their medieval prototypes, these windows ignore the "rational," three-dimensional pictorial space that Western eyes have become used to. Instead, figures stack up on top of each other, and multiple events in the story share the same pictorial space. Figures may be larger or smaller depending on their importance rather than their relationship in space. The Nativity window honors former members of the St. Paul's Guild.
