The Bishop presents a vessel of water, saying

Nicola, take this water, and help me baptize in obedience to our Lord.

People Amen.

Cathedral Clergy present a stole, saying
Nicola, take this stole, and be among us as a pastor and priest.

People Amen.

Representatives of St. Paul's Healing Ministry present olive oil, saying Nicola, use this oil, and be among us as a healer and reconciler.

People Amen.

Cathedral Staff present a Book of Common Prayer, saying Nicola, receive this book, and be among us as a person of prayer.

People Amen.

Representatives of the Choir present a hymnal, saying
Nicola, take this hymnal, and lead us to worship the Lord in the beauty of
holiness.

People Amen.

The Wardens present the keys of the church, saying
Nicola, receive these keys, and let the doors of this place be open to all
people.

People Amen.

Representatives of The Bridge Board on behalf of the Connection Café present a ladle saying

Nicola, take this ladle and be among us as one who serves the hungry.

People Amen.

Representatives of the Diocesan Standing Committee present the Constitution and Canons of this Church, saying

Nicola, obey these Canons, and be among us to share in the councils of this diocese.

People Amen.

Representatives of St. Paul's Altar Guild present bread and wine, saying Nicola, take this bread and wine, and be among us to break the Bread and bless the Cup.

People Amen.

The Bishop then says

Nicola, let all these be signs of the ministry which is mine and yours in this place.

People Amen.

The new Dean then kneels in the midst of the church, saying,

O Lord my God, I am not worthy to have you come under my roof; yet you have called your servant to stand in your house, and to serve at your altar. To you and to your service I devote myself, body, soul, and spirit. Fill my memory with the record of your mighty works; enlighten my understanding with the light of your Holy Spirit; and may all the desires of my heart and will center in what you would have me do. Make me an instrument of your salvation for the people entrusted to my care, and grant that I may faithfully administer your holy Sacraments, and by my life and teaching set forth your true and living Word. Be always with me in carrying out the duties of my ministry. In prayer, quicken my devotion; in praises, heighten my love and gratitude; in preaching, give me readiness of thought and expression; and grant that, by the clearness and brightness of your holy Word, all the world may be drawn into your blessed kingdom. All this I ask for the sake of your Son our Savior Jesus Christ. Amen.

The Bishop and the Senior Warden now escort the Dean to the chair designated for them. The Bishop says

In the name of the Chapter of this Cathedral Church, and on behalf of the people of this Diocese, I install you, Nicola, in the chair appointed to your office. May the Lord stir up in you the flame of holy charity, and the power of faith that overcomes the world. **Amen.**

The Dean sits. The Bishop then presents the new Dean to the congregation, saying
Greet your new Dean.

The People offer their acclamations and applause. Bells may be rung or festive music may be played or sung.

At the invitation of the Bishop, the new Dean then stands and says to the people

The peace of the Lord be always with you.

People And also with you.

The new Dean then greets other members of the clergy, family members, and the congregation. The People greet one another.





The Celebrant continues

Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love.

You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace.

But we failed to honor your image in one another and in ourselves; we would not see your goodness in the world around us; and so we violated your creation, abused one another, and rejected your love. Yet you never ceased to care for us, and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

Through Abraham and Sarah you called us into covenant with you. You delivered us from slavery, sustained us in the wilderness, and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation. Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family, and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory. Giving himself freely to death on the cross, he triumphed over evil, opening the way of freedom and life.

On the night before he died for us, Our Savior Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and give it to his friends, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and then he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. 

Alternatively, you are welcome to receive a blessing, indicated by crossing your arms over your chest. If you are not yet baptized and feel drawn to receive Holy Communion, please speak with a priest about baptism, after the service.



About St. Paul's

St. Paul's has grown with Des Moines, standing as a Christian witness in the life of our community for over a century and a half. We held our first services in October of 1854. The present church building was completed in 1885 and dedicated on Easter Sunday; it was designed by Des Moines architect William Foster of the local architectural firm of Foster & Liebbe in the Gothic Revival style. Our history is exemplified by our commitment to ministry as a downtown church and our intent to remain at the present site as a vital hub in the life of the city and the Diocese of Iowa. In 1992 St. Paul's became the liturgical cathedral for the Diocese of Iowa. In 2010 we were honored by our addition to the National Register of Historic Places. Unique to our location — and indeed to downtown Des Moines — is our labyrinth and rain garden, which replaced an asphalt parking lot on the north side of the church in 2011 with permeable pavement and landscaping with native plants. The labyrinth and rain garden are always open to the public, free of charge.

About our Stained Glass Windows

Inside the nave, our stained-glass windows are original. It is unusual that all were provided by a single company, Groves & Steil of Philadelphia, and the commission has proven to be its most lasting legacy as the largest and last repository of work by one of Philadelphia's most successful 19th-century art glass firms. Fabricated in the then-popular Aesthetic Style, they combine stylized floral and foliage shapes with traditional Christian symbolism and the Victorian language of flowers, giving them multiple levels of meaning, all unified by repeating colors and motifs. The eclectic design of the windows and the memorial quotations suggest that each person or couple who donated a window determined its content themselves, rather than having an overall program decided by clergy or the architect.

About our Organ

The current pipe organ , Op. 3719, was built by Casavant Freres, Ltd. of Saint-Hyacinthe, Quebec. The main organ and chancel was installed in 1993. In 1997 the Antiphonal Division and trumpets were added, and in 2008 the 32-foot contre-violon was added. There are 3,916 pipes, and the biggest weighs 500 lbs. It is one of the largest pipe organs in the state.

About our Carillon – We offer a free live concert every Sunday morning at 9:00 am.

The Windsor Bell Tower, named in honor of Mary Belle Windsor, is one of four carillons in Iowa. There are 25 bells in the tower: the largest bell, which is approximately the size of a Volkswagen, weighs 2660 lbs., and the smallest, weighs 70 lbs. The approximate total weight of the completed carillon is 12,538 lbs. The bells of St. Paul's proclaim our Christian faith beyond the walls of the Cathedral to the ears of all in our community, reminding us that we are one family, coming together to show our unity in Christ.
