




A Reading from the Book of Isaiah



The Holy Gospel

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Jesus went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem. When he had come near Beth'phage and Beth'any, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, saying, "Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone asks you, 'Why are you untying it?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it.'" So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, "Why are you untying the colt?" They said, "The Lord needs it." Then they brought it to Jesus; and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. As he was now approaching the path down from the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, saying, "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord! Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!" Some of the Phar'isees in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, order your disciples to stop." He answered, "I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out."

THE HOMILY

After the Homily, a period of silent reflection is kept.

THE NICENE CREED, standing

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

All stand or kneel as able for prayer.

Deacon God of surprise and joy, help us welcome you into our hearts and your invitation to sacrificial love and eternal life. Let us pray, saying, "We welcome you and follow you."

Intercessor We pray for Michael, our Presiding Bishop; Betsey, our bishop, and for all clergy and people. In our diocese, companion dioceses, and the Anglican Communion we pray for Trinity, Iowa City, Old Brick, Iowa City; St. Laurence, Laurencekirk; St. John the Baptist, Drumlithie; St. Palladius, Drumtochty; St. Andrew, Fasque, Brechin; Gangara Parish, Nzara; Big Bend Parochial District, Swaziland; and The Church of North India (United). Guide your Church to a life of service and sacrifice. Forgive us for serving ourselves and not others. Help us to follow you to the cross and beyond. Let us pray, saying,

People We welcome you and follow you.

Intercessor Teach those who hold authority in the nations of the world. Let them follow your message of love and mercy so that there may be peace on earth. Let us pray, saying,

People We welcome you and follow you.

Intercessor Guide us to be faithful stewards of creation. Teach us to deny our selfish desires and to work for environmental justice. Let us pray, saying,

People We welcome you and follow you.

Intercessor We pray for those preparing for Baptism: Maxine Stender-Custer. Teach us the love of Jesus. Help us forgive others and to love extravagantly. Let us pray saying,

People We welcome you and follow you.

Intercessor Strengthen the afflicted. Comfort and care for those who grieve. Help them to find peace in the midst of loss. Let us pray, saying,

People We welcome you and follow you.

Intercessor Help us to follow you in times of joy and in times of sadness, that we may share in your resurrection. Remember those who have died in the hope of resurrection. For all the departed. Let us pray to the Lord, saying,

People We welcome you and follow you.

Closing collect; spoken by the Celebrant

Almighty God, by your Holy Spirit you have made us one with your saints in heaven and on earth: Grant that in our earthly pilgrimage we may always be supported by this fellowship of love and prayer, and know ourselves to be surrounded by their witness to your power and mercy. We ask this for the sake of Jesus Christ, in whom all our intercessions are acceptable through the Spirit, and who lives and reigns for ever and ever. **Amen.**

THE CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION

All kneel as are able and the Deacon then says Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways, to the glory of your Name. Amen.

The Priest stands and says

Almighty God have mercy on you, forgive you all your sins through our Lord Jesus Christ, strengthen you in all goodness, and by the power of the Holy Spirit keep you in eternal life. **Amen.**



The people stand or kneel. Then the Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the New Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts. 




Ukraine Prayer Ribbons
