THE HOMILY

After the Homily, a period of silent reflection is kept.

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

Deacon: Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Most merciful God, we confess that we have sinned against you in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done, and by what we have left undone. We have not loved you with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves. We are truly sorry and we humbly repent. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, have mercy on us and forgive us; that we may delight in your will, and walk in your ways to the glory of your Name. Amen.

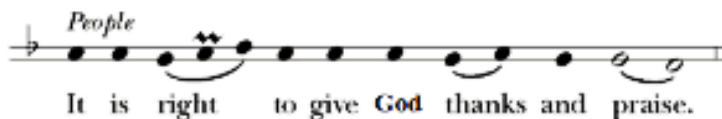

We acclaim you, holy Lord, glorious in power. Your mighty works reveal your wisdom and love. You formed us in your own image, giving the whole world into our care, so that, in obedience to you, our Creator, we might rule and serve all your creatures. When our disobedience took us far from you, you did not abandon us to the power of death. In your mercy you came to our help, so that in seeking you we might find you. Again and again you called us into covenant with you, and through the prophets you taught us to hope for salvation.

Father, you loved the world so much that in the fullness of time you sent your only Son to be our Savior. Incarnate by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, he lived as one of us, yet without sin. To the poor he proclaimed the good news of salvation; to prisoners, freedom; to the sorrowful, joy. To fulfill your purpose he gave himself up to death; and, rising from the grave, destroyed death, and made the whole creation new. And, that we might live no longer for ourselves, but for him who died and rose for us, he sent the Holy Spirit, his own first gift for those who believe, to complete his work in the world, and to bring to fulfillment the sanctification of all. When the hour had come for him to be glorified by you, his heavenly Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end; at supper with them he took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me." Father, we now celebrate this memorial of our redemption. Recalling Christ's death and his descent among the dead, proclaiming his resurrection and ascension to your right hand, awaiting his coming in glory; and offering to you, from the gifts you have given us, this bread and this cup, we praise you and we bless you.

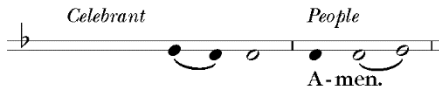

The Central College A Cappella Choir is a select 60-voice ensemble which has gained a reputation for its diverse repertory as well as for its excellence in choral music since its founding in 1932. Although its ranks of students represent a wide range of majors both musical and nonmusical, all are similarly committed to sharing the power of music with local and distant communities. Now in its 90th season, the A Cappella Choir has established numerous, annual choral traditions including the Fall Mini-Tour of Iowa; Christmas Candlelight Concerts; performances at various schools, churches, and cathedrals throughout Iowa; Rock-A-Pella: a spring variety show; and volunteer work preparing Dutch Poffertjes during Pella's Tulip Time celebration in May. The choir also embarks on annual tours and plans international excursions every four years. Recent international tours have included Italy, China, Romania, Brazil and Austria/Germany in 2017, including performances at places like St. Stephan's Cathedral in Vienna.

The choirs are under the direction of Mark Babcock, M. Joan Farver Endowed Chair in Music and Director of Choral Activities. Professor Babcock began teaching at Central in 1999. In addition to teaching, he is the Cathedral Organist/Choirmaster/Carillonneur at the historic St. Paul's Episcopal Cathedral in Des Moines and is the immediate Past President of the Iowa Choral Directors' Association. **The choir's accompanist is Christopher Ellerston**. He teaches secondary vocal music in the Eddyville-Blakesburg-Fremont Schools. He is also the Organist/Choirmaster at St. Mark Lutheran Church in West Des Moines and is active in ICDA.
