THE STRIPPING OF THE ALTAR

Psalm 22 is chanted or recited and the altars are stripped of all vestments, hangings, and decorations and the lights are slowly extinguished as the church turns to remember Christ's Passion.

- 23 For he does not despise nor abhor the poor in their poverty; neither does he hide his face from them; * but when they cry to him he hears them.
 - 24 My praise is of him in the great assembly; * I will perform my vows in the presence of those who worship him.
- 25 The poor shall eat and be satisfied, and those who seek the LORD shall praise him: * "May your heart live for ever!"

RESERVATION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT

After the altar has been stripped of all vestments, hangings, and decorations, the Bishop carries the Blessed Sacrament to the Altar of Repose in the chapel. All are invited to join the procession to the chapel.

THE WATCH

The account of Jesus' prayer in Gethsemane and his arrest is read, after which the Watch in front of the Blessed Sacrament commences in the Chapel. The Watch concludes at 10:00 pm.

Luke 22: 39 – 53

He came out and went, as was his custom, to the Mount of Olives; and the disciples followed him. When he reached the place, he said to them, "Pray that you may not come into the time of trial." Then he withdrew from them about a stone's throw, knelt down, and prayed, "Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me; yet, not my will but yours be done." Then an angel from heaven appeared to him and gave him strength. In his anguish he prayed more earnestly, and his sweat became like great drops of blood falling down on the ground. When he got up from prayer, he came to the disciples and found them sleeping because of grief, and he said to them, "Why are you sleeping? Get up and pray that you may not come into the time of trial." While he was still speaking, suddenly a crowd came, and the one called Judas, one of the twelve, was leading them. He approached Jesus to kiss him; but Jesus said to him, "Judas, is it with a kiss that you are betraying the Son of Man?"

When those who were around him saw what was coming, they asked, "Lord, should we strike with the sword?" Then one of them struck the slave of the high priest and cut off his right ear. But Jesus said, "No more of this!" And he touched his ear and healed him. Then Jesus said to the chief priests, the officers of the temple police, and the elders who had come for him, "Have you come out with swords and clubs as if I were a bandit? When I was with you day after day in the temple, you did not lay hands on me. But this is your hour, and the power of darkness!"



All are invited to keep vigil in the Chapel in prayer until 10:00 pm. When you are ready to leave, please depart in silence. Vigil is kept in remembrance of our Savior's words: "Could you not watch with me one hour?"

Good Friday Downtown Way of the Cross - March 29, 2024

Join us for the annual downtown Way of the Cross and reflection on Good Friday, March 29th. We will begin at 1:30 in front of First United Methodist Church (10th & Pleasant) and will proceed to seven other stops: - St. Paul's Episcopal Cathedral (9th & High) - Catholic Pastoral Center (6th & Grand), - Elsie Mason Manor (5th & Grand), - Cowles Commons (Locust & 3rd), - Polk County Court House (Northwest Corner), - St. Ambrose Cathedral (6th and High), -St. John's Lutheran Church (600 6th Ave.) Each stop will feature a reflection on Scripture. You are welcome to join at any point on the procession, and are welcome to carry the cross for a small part of the solemn walk. Families and children are encouraged to participate. The Way of the Cross is sponsored by The Bridge, an ecumenical initiative among the four downtown churches (First United Methodist, St. John's Lutheran, St. Ambrose Catholic Cathedral, and St. Paul's Episcopal Cathedral). The Bridge is the parent organization of The Connection Café, which serves lunch to the homeless and low-income community downtown, five days a week.

Mark your calendars for the Bishop's Visitation on April 14!




